Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

Parenting is a complex, rewarding and challenging vocation. As a survival tactic, moms and dads tend to selectively forget bad news and focus their hope and energy on the good. In today's Gospel, the news that Mary and Joseph got when they brought their infant son to the Temple must have thrown them for a loop! An old man they'd never met insisted their son would be a success story for his nation and a path for foreigners to follow. He would be a game-changer for the powerful and the voiceless alike. He would face great opposition and cause great suffering—to his mother; the absence of his father in this prediction sounded ominous. Meanwhile, at the sight of their baby, a prophetess immediately gave thanks for his life and began to tell everyone that God's ancient promises were about to come true.

What did his parents think of all this? Could one child bring such sweeping and opposing destinies into reality by his mere existence? Greatness on one hand; hostility on the other. Perhaps they put away the dark predictions and set their sights on the bright ones. Or they may have shelved both in favor of focusing on the happy now of parenthood. They had a child to raise, an income to earn, water to draw, and meals to prepare. Life was full enough in the moment. You can't live in tomorrow. The proper place for mortals is always today. This holy family learned early that trusting in God today includes entrusting the future to God until tomorrow arrives. God was sufficient in Bethlehem as in Nazareth, in the manger as in the Temple. God would continue to be sufficient wherever the future took their son. God is sufficient wherever the future finds you. ~ *Fr. Jim*

Diocese of Rockville Centre

announces Morning Star Initiative

The Diocese of Rockville Centre has launched a bold plan, called the Morning Star Initiative, to revitalize Catholic elementary school education on Long Island. The goal of this initiative is to restore a robust Catholic culture to the DRVC schools, improve academics, and create a more fiscally sustainable model for schools. The Diocese will partner with the Marianist Brothers, who have two centuries of Catholic educational commitment and expertise, including three schools in Nassau County. The Diocese has asked Brother Thomas Cleary, S.M., President of Chaminade High School, to serve as the Chief Revitalization Officer and to spearhead this effort. He will be assisted by his fellow Marianists, who will seek feedback and ideas from the full spectrum of those with a stake in a revitalized Catholic elementary education, including our parishioners.



It's about fair representation. Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets. It's also about redistricting. After each decade's census, state officials redraw the boundaries of the congressional and state legislative districts in their states to account for population shifts.

St. Margaret's choir needs your voice.



Becoming a Catholic Christian~ RCIA

‘Never again’: Pope Francis on Holocaust Remembrance Day

This past Monday, January 27th, marked the 75th anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp by Soviet troops. Pope Francis asked for people to spend a moment in prayer and recollection for International Holocaust Remembrance Day. (Even though the date has passed, his request is still important.)

Between 1940 and 1945, the Nazi regime murdered 1.1 million people in Auschwitz. That number includes 960,000 Jews (865,000 of whom were gassed on arrival!), 74,000 non-Jewish Poles, 21,000 Roma, 15,000 Soviet prisoners of war, and up to 15,000 other Europeans. (About one-sixth of the Jews who were caught up in the Holocaust perished in Auschwitz.)

“In the face of this huge tragedy, this atrocity, indifference is not admissible and memory is a must,” Pope Francis said in his Angelus address last Sunday, January 26th. He invited each person to spend a moment in prayer and recollection with “each person saying in his own heart: ‘never again, never again!’”

Earlier in the week, Pope Francis recalled his visit to the Nazi concentration camp in Poland in 2016:

“I went there to reflect and to pray in silence. In our world, with its whirlwind of activity, we find it hard to pause, to look within and to listen in silence to the plea of suffering humanity,” he said. “If we lose our memory, we destroy our future. May the anniversary of the unspeakable cruelty that humanity learned of 75 years ago serve as a summons to pause, to be still and to remember. We need to do this, lest we become indifferent,” Pope Francis continued.

The pope also condemned the current “barbaric resurgence” of cases of anti-Semitism in the world, and urged the need to respect each person’s human dignity. “It is troubling to see, in many parts of the world, an increase in selfishness and indifference, lack of concern for others and the attitude that says life is good as long as it is good for me, and when things go wrong, anger and malice are unleashed,” the Holy Father cautioned. “This creates a fertile ground for the forms of factionalism and populism we see around us, where hatred quickly springs up,” he said. “Even recently, we have witnessed a barbaric resurgence of cases of anti-Semitism. Once more I firmly condemn every form of anti-Semitism.”
