

Dear Parishioners and Visitors,


Human experience is wrapped in mystery. Both birth and death are beyond our understanding, and what's in between is not exactly simple or clear. Whether we believe that death is an end or a portal to God, we are on a journey toward somewhere, and we'll get there sooner or later. This is not the most precise description, but that is basically what the Lord says in today's Gospel section. And the disciples' reaction is something we can relate to: uncertainty. Trusting Jesus was a challenge even for those who knew him, who shared years on the road with him, who broke bread with him.

The Second Reading uses a different image to help us deal with this uncertainty. We are stones being built into a design that we cannot comprehend. The weight of our own destinies may be burdensome to us, but not to the builder who knows precisely how to shape and place us. In his hands, we will assume the perfect contour for our position in the structure, and where we wind up could not be more right. Again, a call to faith and trust. Letting go requires confidence in the kind, wise and loving God that Jesus revealed!

All this talk about not having definite guidelines or clear paths is fitting on this Mother's Day weekend. From the first inkling of pregnancy through the nine months and birth, each mother-to-be has only general guidelines, no precise directions. And what comes after! Being so important yet being taken for granted. Loving, yet needing to discipline. Being a chauffeur one minute and a confidant the next. On and on, no clear guide at any point. Happy Mother's Day to mothers who are on the journey for the first time, or who are "old hands at it" or have been called back into service for another round!


SUNDAY MASS AVAILABLE ON ST MARGARET'S WEBSITE

Vatican releases free downloadable book of pope's homilies, prayers for 'difficult times'

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- The Vatican published a free downloadable book of Pope Francis' prayers and homilies responding to the trial and suffering of the coronavirus pandemic.

Titled "Strong in the Face of Tribulation," the book also contains suggestions for Catholics who are unable to receive the sacraments due to restrictive measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The book, which was released April 21, is available in English, Italian, Spanish and French and will be updated several times a week "with new homilies and other interventions made by the pope," said Andrea Torielli, editorial director of the Vatican Dicastery for Communication.

"This book is intended to be a little help offered to all, so as to know how to discern and experience God's closeness and tenderness in pain, in suffering, in solitude and in fear," Torielli wrote in the book's introduction.

"Thousands of people are gravely ill, thousands have died," he wrote. "Many families mourn their loved ones, to whom they were unable to stay close, to whom they were unable to say farewell, and who were cremated without the possibility of a funeral."

For Catholics, he added, not participating in the liturgy or the sacraments, "aggravates this condition of uncertainty, discomfort and confusion."

Nevertheless, Torielli said the church's invitation to "renew our faith in the risen Christ" has sparked creativity, especially among priests who, through the use of technology, "make themselves present in the life of their communities and families confined to their homes in semi-deserted cities."

The editorial director said that when lived "in its essential elements," Christian faith can offer an outlook on reality that offers the possibility of seeing God's love and experiencing the unity of the church even amid solitude and isolation.


As we begin a new calendar month, I want to share with you some practical details of our parish during these difficult past six (!) weeks.

Parish Life All parish programs and church services were suspended by March 20th. Videoing Sunday Masses began on a regular basis on Palm Sunday. In addition to the video Mass, Fr. Paul and Fr. Jim celebrate private Masses for requested intentions. Unfortunately, that suspension included funerals and weddings. But, if a family requests, a short prayer of commendation outside the church as a deceased person is being taken to the cemetery is available. Concerted efforts are being made to stay connected with our people through the various ministries. Julie in Outreach and the Food Pantry is available on a modified basis. She also oversees the requests and questions that come into the Parish Office. Jackie as Faith Formation Coordinator is in regular contact with catechists and families. Dan (Music Director) plans the music and is the musician for our video Masses, as well as offering other resources on our website. Lisa (Business Manager) oversees our business details and stays alert to ongoing info from the Diocese. Mike (Facilities Manager) keeps the plant running. Fr. Paul and Fr. Jim work together in planning the Masses as well as spending time connecting with parishioners as they can.

Personnel Parish Staff members have been dividing their time between working from home and coming into the office on limited bases. Unfortunately, the pandemic has meant changes in employment. All part-time workers had to be furloughed and the full-time Staff had to have their hours/salaries reduced by about 40%.

Finance As you will not be surprised to see thanks to the graph, income has declined steeply. As with most of you, we are on utility budgets, so even though we might be using less, we are still be paying the budgeted amount. No unnecessary purchases are happening. Please remember that any amount you can donate is welcome and helpful to the life of our parish!

Confirmation Preparation

Confirmation II

As we will not have class meetings before Confirmation, let's finish the Chosen Book. Chapter 23 "How do I build the Kingdom?"

Each generation of Catholics must do their part to "build the Church." The apostles, disciples and their followers built on their Jewish roots and scripture to spread the message of Jesus Christ from Jerusalem to spread the "Word" through the known world.

The most famous of all church buildings is probably St Peter's Basilica in Rome. The building we see today is not the only church to ever stand on the grave of Peter, who had been buried in a small shrine on the side of the Vatican Hill (for which the area was named). Emperor Constantine started what was known as "Old St Peter's" built after Catholicism was legalized in 323. The cemetery hill was flattened and filled in making St Peter's tomb now on top of the hill. It was completed after his death.

The current building's planning started under Pope Nicholas V prior to his death in 1455. Old St Peter's had fallen into disrepair during the time the popes were in Avignon, France. It was Pope Julius II who decided the new basilica needed to be grander than Nicholas planned and began a succession of great artists who would build what we now see, taking 176 years, from start to finish.

It was only during an archeological dig during World War II looking for the original shrine that it and St Peter's bones were uncovered. Very often, what we start is not completed in our lifetime. We do our part and pass it on to the following generations.

Have you thought about your part in building the Church? Like St Peter's, have your plans for your future transformed as we have gathered? How are you called to be Christ in the world today?





Praying the Rosary

1. Make the Sign of the Cross.
 2. Holding the Crucifix, say the *Apostles' Creed*.
 3. On the first bead, say an *Our Father*.
 4. Say one *Hail Mary* on each of the next three beads.
 5. Say the *Glory Be*
 6. For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery (perhaps followed by a brief reading from Scripture) then say the *Our Father*.
 7. While fingering each of the ten beads of the decade, next say ten *Hail Mary's* while meditating on the Mystery. Then say a *Glory Be*.
- After saying the five decades, say the *Hail, Holy Queen*, followed by this dialogue and prayer:
- V. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God.
R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.
Let us pray: O God, whose Only Begotten Son, by his life, Death, and Resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal life, grant, we beseech thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Praying for Health Care Workers

White Masses (so named for the white coats and uniforms worn by many healthcare professionals) are special opportunities to ask God's blessings for those serving in the medical field.
