Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

This week we have two different celebrations: Memorial Day and Ascension Thursday. Memorial Day, of course, is associated with the last Monday of May. Ascension Thursday can vary greatly, depending on the date of Easter. It is not usual for Ascension to be this late in May, but this year it is.

On Memorial Day, Americans are asked to pause and honor the sacrifices of those who died in military service to our country, perhaps by a visit to a cemetery or attending a parade. For some people, the losses connected with this day can be painful. But, for all of us, this day is a reminder that we are part of a nation that started before we were born and will continue after we die. All generations are linked together.

On Ascension Day, Christians seek to balance two simultaneous beliefs: (1) that Jesus departed from this world to be totally united with God the Eternal Father; and (2) that he emphatically remains with us! There are several ways that we celebrate this abiding presence of the Lord: through his promise to be with his Church for all time, through the action of his Spirit, through the Sacraments and Scripture, through service to those in need ("What you do to the least of my sisters and brothers, you do to me."). ~ *Fr. BUILDING A SAFER CHURCH

A look at how the Diocese of Rockville Centre is working to ensure a safe environment.

Office for the Protection of Children & Young People

- Assisting Survivors
- Educating the Faithful
- Ensuring a Safe Environment

Since its establishment in 2003, the Diocese of Rockville Centre Office for the Protection of Children and Young People has remained vigilant and responsive to the safe environment concerns in parishes across Long Island. It has also grown to reflect the changing multicultural population of the diocese. Mary McMahon, LCSW, the office's director since 2014, spoke with *The Long Island Catholic Magazine* to discuss the office and its latest initiatives

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE OFFICE FOR THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE?

During the biannual meeting of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops in June 2002, the bishops established protocols to assist dioceses throughout the United States in response to allegations of clergy abuse and misconduct. The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People — more commonly referred to as The Charter — mandated that each diocese establish specific measures to assist survivors of clergy abuse, to educate the faithful and to ensure protection of the faithful in the future. In response to this directive, the Diocese of Rockville Centre developed the Diocesan Child Protection Policy, which established the Office for the Protection of Children and Young People.

From inception in 2003, the office has remained constant in providing outreach and assistance to survivors of abuse (Mandate 1 of The Charter); developing safe environment programming for clergy, laity and children (Mandate 2); and developing measures for accountability (Mandate 3).

WHAT DOES THE OFFICE DO ON A DAILY BASIS?

Well, first — no two days are ever the same. In addition to myself, the office is staffed by three very dedicated women. We try to start each day together with five minutes of prayer, to remember why we do what we do, to ask for grace to stay strong in our convictions and to pray for the graces of healing for all we will encounter that day. Then, the day starts to roll.

The diocese has 133 parishes that offer many activities, including hosting VIRTUS classes, faith formation classes and other ministries involving youths and adults. On most days there will be messages and emails from participants, facilitators and ministry leaders. We try to respond to these as early in the day as possible. And then there is the flow of paperwork: VIRTUS attendance sheets to process, meetings in parishes, arranging trainings, outreach to parishes - and always updating records for the annual audit (Mandate 3).

The priority for me is to check for messages on the diocesan hotline and my personal line. Whenever a call comes in from a survivor or anyone reporting abuse, I try to return it as soon as I am able. I want to dedicate as much time as the caller requires when I respond, so sometimes I will reach out later in the day or early evening when I won't be distracted. I also try to schedule a time to meet with the individual; that is not always possible, but it is always offered. More than anything, I want a survivor to know the diocese is listening, cares and is sorry.

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HOW MANY CALLS REGARDING ALLEGATIONS OF CLERGY ABUSE DO YOU RECEIVE?

I think this is the good news — reports that come to the office are allegations of abuse that occurred many years ago. The VIRTUS program, background screening, Think First & Stay Safe (children's program), ongoing clergy training, annual audits — all these point to the fact that when you offer a solid program and the entire community is educated and engaged, change is possible. That being said, the diocese remains steadfast and vigilant in its efforts to maintain the standards of safety we have in place.

HOW HAS THE OFFICE CHANGED SINCE ITS INCEPTION?

This is the exciting part! In 2014 the office was one person — now it is four!

When I started visiting parishes in 2014, two issues jumped out. One was that every pastor wanted to be in compliance with the mandates of The Charter — and in fact was trying to be in compliance — but every parish was doing it differently. The second issue was enhancing the presence of VIRTUS within the Spanish-speaking community. We had Spanish-speaking facilitators, but there were only a handful to meet the demands of a very large population.

In 2015, Arely Mendoza-Cantos joined the office as liaison to the Spanish-speaking community. Arely has trained Spanish-speaking VIRTUS facilitators, met with Spanish clergy, translated the Child Protection Policy and has been a tremendous asset in bringing safe environment awareness to the community.

Next, Arely and I tackled the issue of parish compliance, developing a

Safe Environment Binder containing all the required forms, suggested methods of collecting data and a safe environment checklist. Our goal is to meet with each pastor so that we understand the unique needs of each parish. To date we have met with 37 pastors; I must confess this has taken longer than we expected. It's a process, and Rockville Centre is a large diocese.

The reality is that the challenge of safe environment happens on the local level — in the individual parishes. The office recognizes that, and we are very grateful to those on the local level who do the work of keeping accurate records, making sure volunteers in every parish ministry have been background screened and VIRTUS trained. The office would not be at the level it is today without the commitment and cooperation of each parish. Of course, the ideal would be that each parish could have a safe environment coordinator to manage the safe environment compliance.

THINK FIRST & STAY SAFE

Joanne Winter came on board in 2017 as coordinator of the Think First & Stay Safe program. Think First is a program for children that, starting with the 2018-2019 academic year, is being rolled out through the faith formation programs in each parish. During the faith formation orientation meetings in the fall, parents were introduced to the Think First program, received a parent's handbook and were encouraged to reinforce the topic of safety with their child.

Just recently, Patricia DiTomasso joined our team. Patricia assists parishes with the task of updating their VIRTUS records. This is an enormous task, one in which all of us are involved. When the phone isn't ringing — and one of us has a free moment — we grab a parish report and begin the tedious and time-consuming task of checking the volunteer list against the VIRTUS database. All these changes really point to the vision of the office: to be vigilant and responsive to the safe environment needs of the diocese and to remain open to direction from the Holy Spirit.

I have a plaque in my office with a quote from Scripture that reminds me that we are not alone in our efforts: "There is a peculiar power of God about that place. He who has his dwelling in heaven, watches over it and defends it" (2 Maccabees 3:39).

Sweet surrender

Today's saint, Augustine of Canterbury, is best known for having a major hand in England's conversion to Christianity. During his lifetime (around 600), however, he was not seen as a success. He lost his nerve the first time he tried to cross the English Channel; he was disregarded by the powerful Britons for his perceived rudeness. And yet the seeds he planted in faith bore fruit, helping to firmly establish Christianity in Britain. Perhaps you might offer a prayer of surrender today, allowing God's grace to transform any seeming failures or shortcomings in your life.

Everyone loves a great story

The 1965 film classic about the life of Jesus was called *The Greatest Story Ever Told*. You can't argue with that title with regard to any telling of the life of Jesus. Aside from its supreme importance as the story of our salvation, it follows established dramatic structure to perfection: exposition (Jesus' background and ministry), rising action (his arrest and Passion), black moment when all is lost (his death), and climax, when the protagonist wins (his Resurrection). Then there's the dénouement, when everything finally makes sense—and that's when the Holy Spirit comes in, to help you tell this story to the world.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 16:22-34; John 16:5-11 (292). *"For if I do not go, the Advocate will not come to you."*

EASTER WEEKDAY

There's Good News for the world

When Saint Paul—arguably the greatest and perhaps first Christian missionary—came to Greece, the birthplace of Western philosophy, he engaged his hearers on their own terms. His words about the nature of God and God's Son intrigued them, but because Paul boldly spoke about Christ's Resurrection as well, many simply walked away snickering. We are told, though, that others said, "We should like to hear you on this some other time." In 2019 the Good News of Jesus Christ should likewise engage the "secular world"—which is by definition *secular*: The Latin

saeculum means the "present world"—on its own terms. Like Paul we stay engaged with others with respect and above all with love.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 17:15, 22—18:1; John 16:12-15 (293). *"Paul left them. But some did join him, and became believers."*

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

All endings are new beginnings

Easter was over several weeks ago, right? Not really, because the story goes on. The post-Resurrection Jesus appeared to his disciples. He ate with them. And he spent 40 days preparing them to continue his mission. Today we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension, recalling the day Jesus ascended from this human life to enter divine glory and be "seated at God's right hand."

Ascension brings to a remarkable close the Easter events that we call the "Pascal Mystery": the Passion, death, and Resurrection of Jesus. Yet this really is not an end either. After the Ascension, the disciples returned to Jerusalem with joy, ready and eager for what was to come. Let's roll up our sleeves and carry on their ministry.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 1:1-11; Ephesians 1:17-23 or Hebrews 9:24-28; 10:19-23; Luke 24:46-53 (58). *"Then he raised his hands, and blessed them . . . and they returned to Jerusalem with great joy."*

Share your faith



Railings Are In



The first set of new **railings** was installed last week., and some parishioners even had a chance to try out the new stairway last Sunday. By the time you read this, the second set should be in as well. The next step is taking care of some finishing details on the stairs themselves.

Then it is on to the **front entrance bridge** replacement. We anticipate that will begin sometime in the second week of June.

Please remember: once the front bridge is taken down, the only entrances will be by the side stairways.

We have confirmation that the **gas mains** for the Parish Center should be installed during the first weeks of July. This will allow us to convert the Center from oil to gas during the summer and enter the fall/winter heating season with a new more efficient heating system.

The furnace will be replaced and the circulator pumps updated so we do not need to place catering pans under them to catch drips. We will also be able to **remediate the oil tank** in the yard next to the Center.

We continue planning for the **kitchen and restroom work** to happen this summer while the lower level of the church is unused. Pray!

Proposed Schedule of Work

PHASE I **Fall 2018**

Approximate Cost: \$450,000

- Replace the Church Entrance Bridge and Side Stairways
- Mandated Removal of the oil tank in the Parish Center and replace the Boiler
- Update the Kitchen in the Auditorium

PHASE II **Fall 2019**

Approximate Cost: \$290,000

- Update Auditorium Bathrooms and Replace Parish Center's Handicapped lift
- Add Handicapped Parking spaces and Re-coat & re-stripe the Parking lot
- Install new padding on the kneelers

PHASE III **Fall 2020**

Approximate Cost: \$210,000

- Update Fire and Security Alarm systems in the Church and Parish Center
- Replace the Sidewalks
- Replace the Windows in the Parish Center
