Please notedue to privacy issues, we can include names given by the individual or a health care proxy only. Thank you. When I started these columns on parish finances two weeks ago, I covered the subject of Mass attendance first. I would like to begin with this topic now as I finish up this series. I wish to emphasize therefore that **parish finances are healthiest when Catholics attend Mass regularly.** This point may be obvious but it underscores how devotion to the faith is connected to fiscal strength. Those who come to church are more likely to support the parish financially than are those who do not come to church regularly.

So, let me urge all Saint Margaret parishioners to heed the commandment to keep holy the sabbath and come to church on Sundays (or on Saturday evenings) and Holy Days of Obligation. Holiness and stewardship go together. When we practice the former, we attend to the latter **at the same time**.

Church-going is related to discernment. By discernment, I mean our faith bids us to decide things in life by the criterion of faith. In other words, we decide things according to a well-formed conscience. In my first column, I used the expression **generous sacrificial giving**. I return to it now because generosity is integrally related to faith. Faith-filled people are generous because the Lord is first generous with them. He has given us life, talents and grace. We show our gratitude to the Lord for His blessings by generously using what He has conferred upon us. God did not spare His Son; rather, He gave the Son to us lest we perish and die. Eternal life, we know, comes to us at a cost – the cost being a life. By sacrificing Himself on the Cross for us, Jesus teaches that true love cannot be shown without sacrifice.

We exercise generosity and sacrifice in that to which we give the treasure portion of our stewardship. That **generous sacrificial giving** is made manifest in writing out a check, placing it in an offering envelope which comes to my home, and then placing that same envelope in a basket which comes to me in God's home – the church. That solemn act of **generous sacrificial giving** honors what God has done for me in the gift of His Incarnate Son.

If you are unable to be present for Mass on a weekend, if you are ill, for instance, or if you happen to be away on vacation – whenever you are prevented from worshipping with us, please send your **weekly offering** in the regular mail or electronically. The bulletin offers details on how to contribute to Saint Margaret electronically. A fair number of parishioners already supports our parish this way. Join those who give of themselves even if they cannot be present in the pew for a good reason.

With all of the attention on how to give up to this point, let me say a few words here at the end about what we need as a parish. You may have seen over the last few weeks in the bulletin that the weekend collection has come in at \$11,000.00 or so. May I ask that we seek to raise that total figure about a thousand dollars more **each weekend up to 12,000.00**. The method for doing so I outlined in my column last weekend. Recall how I used the categories: under \$10.00; between \$10.00 and \$25.00; over \$25.00 and up to \$49.00 and \$50.00 and higher. We can get to \$12,000.00 if enough parishioners take a step – a step being an increase within a category **or** a jump to the next category. I ask that you consider my request prayerfully and act accordingly. Thank you.

I will give further updates in the weeks and months to come through the bulletin. As always, I am grateful for the trust you show in supporting Saint Margaret. Let us seek to do more financially that we may continue to be faithful to the mission we have in this portion of the Lord's vineyard.


Becoming a Catholic Christian & Completing your Confirmation ~ RCIA

Tuesday, Feb 08 MEMORIAL OF JOSEPHINE BAKHITA Time to stop traffic

Each year, the International Day of Prayer and Awareness against Human Trafficking falls on this day—the feast day of Saint Josephine Bakhita, F.D.C.C. In 1877, while still a young girl, Bakhita was kidnapped from her Sudanese village and sold—many times over—as a slave. She was brutalized for 12 years, her body a bundle of scars from being whipped and tortured. But human trafficking isn't just a problem from long ago, happening only in faraway places. Today, the United States remains one of the world's top three trafficked nations. Pray for—and learn more about—trafficking victims by visiting sistersagainsttrafficking.org. Wednesday, Feb 09 Be a truly "catholic" Christian

In our daily lives as Catholics, it's easy to forget that we are members of a big church. Most of us are members of the Latin Church, which is the largest of the two dozen churches that make up the Catholic Church. The other 23 are Eastern churches. They use different liturgies, and some were established during the earliest times in church history. The Ethiopian Catholic Church, for example, uses the ancient Ge'ez liturgy—one of the oldest in existence—and can be traced back to the missionary work of Saint Mark the Apostle. Today, remember that the Catholic Church is truly universal! TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Kings 10:1-10; Mark 7:14-23 (331). "The queen of Sheba, having heard of Solomon's fame, came to test him with subtle questions."*

Thursday, Feb 10 MEMORIAL OF SCHOLASTICA The truth behind the tradition continues

Tradition says that Scholastica, today's saint, had significant influence on her twin, Saint Benedict of Nursia, who codified the monastic way of life with his famous Rule. The lack of documentation on Scholastica's life is curious, given her centrality in shaping Benedictine life. There are written accounts of her, but they are sparse. While the historical record is lean, clearly Benedictine women, of whom Scholastica is said to be the first, have achieved spiritual greatness, scholarship, and leadership in their own right over the centuries and illuminated the faith for all of us. TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Kings 11:4-13; Mark 7:24-30 (332). "For saying this, you may go. The demon has gone out of your daughter."*

Friday, Feb 11 MEMORIAL OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES Release the power of your touch

During the COVID-19 pandemic, many people have suffered from a sense of isolation and alienation, this despite the myriad forms of modern communication from calls, to Zoom, to social media posts. Nothing is quite the same as the up close and personal—a handshake, a pat on the back, an embrace, or a kiss. Indeed, as many physicians, spiritual healers, and wisdom figures will tell you, humans not only need physical touch but it has healing benefits. Jesus puts a finger in a man's ear and rubs his own saliva into the man's mouth to cure him. Through his touch, Jesus gives part of himself to others. Perhaps that is the secret to all healing. Each of us giving of ourselves to help others. Pray to Our Lady of Lourdes for the opportunity to provide a healing touch to someone in need. TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Kings 11:29* -32; 12:19; Mark 7:31-37 (333). "He makes the deaf hear and the mute speak."

Saturday, Feb 12 OPTIONAL MEMORIAL OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Seventh heaven

From ancient times, the number seven was seen as the number of spirituality, perhaps because of the "seven moving luminaries" visible to the naked eye (the Sun and Moon, Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn). There are many examples of the use of the number seven in both Testaments, from the seven days of creation in Genesis to the seven churches of Revelation. Catholicism celebrates seven sacraments, identifies seven deadly sins and seven virtues, seven gifts of the Holy Spirit, and seven corporal and spiritual works of mercy. Today, the seventh day of the week, is a good day to reflect on the seven sorrows and seven joys of the Blessed Virgin Mary. TODAY'S READINGS: *1 Kings 12:26-32; 13:33-34; Mark 8:1-10 (334). "Then, taking the seven loaves he gave thanks."*
