

On this last Sunday of November, the Church begins her Advent observance. So, I begin this column with some remarks about this holy season of preparation for Christmas.

"The holidays" are making it more difficult to acknowledge any period of preparation for Christmas. Before "the holidays" overwhelmed Advent, we saw calendars and wreaths galore which helped us to count down the days to Our Savior's birth. Try looking for those calendars and wreaths now and you are likely to come up empty handed.

I ask you to join the effort to hold onto Advent. Find a good religious goods store and get your hands on an Advent calendar and an Advent wreath. And, of course, display them where you can. To be sure, it's a modest effort, but one that is in sync with *Keep Christ in Christmas*. That's the expression we use now to keep our attention focused on the real meaning of Christmas. Advent calendars and wreaths are reminders that the Incarnation begins the central drama of history. Without a birth, why would we ever mark a death and Resurrection?

The central drama of history is that God loves us so much that He would give us His Son. What we have is a mystery so unlike any other. God becomes like us and we become like Him. We need time to appreciate the Christmas mystery and that is why is so important. Advent is time. It is the *time* we have to recognize that God has redeemed *all of time* by sending us His Son *in time*.

We place ourselves, paradoxically, under the dominion of a timeless God. For God Who is outside of time, there is only the eternal now. To dwell with God for all eternity, we must learn the holiness of time. And that's what we do when we take the time to mark Advent – we learn the holiness of time. May this holy season of Advent bring us in time to the stable in Bethlehem to adore the God Who is over all and through all and in all. (cf. Eph 4:6)

On Monday night, the 28th, we will have a Holy Hour in church from 7:00 to 8:00 PM. We ask all parishioners to consider joining us for this spiritual exercise. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed and there will be Benediction at the close of the hour. To enter into the Advent spirit, there isn't a better way than by coming into the Lord's Presence and knowing His peace. The Holy Hour is also a way for us to witness to the Eucharistic Revival which we hope and pray is taking place in our midst.

On Thursday, December 8th, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. It is a Holy Day of Obligation. There is Mass in the morning at 9:00 AM and in the evening at 7:00 PM.

Later in Advent, we will have our second edition of Lessons and Carols. It is being offered this year on Sunday, December 18th at 4:00 PM in the church. Our choir will lead us in the carols portion of the service. The rite also includes readings from Sacred Scripture. There is a reception in the church basement immediately following the spiritual exercise. Mark your calendar and make a point of joining us.

While it is still a few months off, mention should be made that our Lenten observance will reflect our participation in the **Eucharistic Revival.** During Lent, we will have evenings of enrichment (Mondays) in the church beginning at 7:30 PM and going until 9:00 PM on the topic of the Holy Eucharist. Continue to watch the bulletin for details.

As we make our way through Advent, I call attention to the Sacrament of Penance. Please remember that we have confessions every Saturday afternoon at 4:00 PM. Advent is a very good time to examine your conscience, confess your sins and do penance. There will be additional hours set aside for the Sacrament of Penance in the days leading up to Christmas. But you needn't wait till right before we celebrate the Lord's birth. The Lord's pardon and peace await you on Saturday afternoons. Come and be reconciled with the Lord Who wants to grant you His grace and mercy.

Have a good Advent. Follow the Lord to His birth in Bethlehem by following first the prophet Isaiah, Saint John the Baptist and the Blessed Virgin Mary.





The song celebrates holiday parties, caroling, mistletoe, good cheer, and loved ones near. But for believers, the season beginning today is really about anticipation and Incarnation, light illuminating the darkness, and God coming near. We know what time it is. Make this Advent a genuine celebration of hope.

Time to get ready!

With the Thanksgiving holiday weekend wrapped up, Catholics yesterday began the Advent journey to Christmas. The word *advent* comes from Latin for "to come." All the days from now until the celebration of the birth of Jesus are preparation for his coming. Preparation in this case means remembering to be ready with a spirit of both penance and joy. Did you set out an Advent wreath on your dinner table yesterday? For many, it's the first of many Christmas decorations to come out—with festooned trees not far behind. The wreath is more than just a pretty adornment but also a daily reminder to pray as you count down each week with a new candle. Start the season out right by blessing your wreath with a prayer.

Listen with the ear of a child

"Advent is not a time to declare, but to listen, to listen to whatever God may want to tell us through the singing of the stars, the quickening of a baby, the gallantry of a dying man," wrote Christian writer Madeleine L'Engle, born this day in 1918. L'Engle is especially known for her children's books, including *A Wrinkle in Time*, which won the 1963 Newberry Medal. This Advent, consider what it might be like to imitate the Christ Child instead of the adult Jesus. As *A Wrinkle in Time* tells us: "To love is to be vulnerable; and it is only in vulnerability and risk—not safety and security—that we overcome darkness."

Be first to follow the Lord

It's no coincidence that Saint Andrew the Apostle is linked to Advent (which traditionally begins on the Sunday closest to his feast day). In Eastern Christianity he is known as *protokletos*, "first called," because it was Andrew, who had been a disciple of John the Baptist, who persuaded his brother Simon (whom we know as Peter) to follow Jesus with his words, "We have found the

Messiah!" Andrew also has a devotion linked to Advent, known as the Saint Andrew Novena. Try it out and see if it supports and deepens your living out your own call.

Build on higher ground

Anyone who has followed the news over the past year has seen more images than ever of people coping with floods. Families waiting on rooftops, people stuffed in boats, neighbors wading through murky water. Jesus constantly used images to make his point, including the image of discipleship as a solid house that stands firm during storms and floods. "Be faithful in small things because it is in them that your strength lies," Saint Teresa of Calcutta once said. Are you building a strong, flood-proof house in the small things you do each day?

Walk with each other

Today, the church remembers martyrs Jean Donovan, Maura Clarke, Dorothy Kazel, and Ita Ford, brutally murdered for standing with the poor in war-torn El Salvador in 1980. Their witness still speaks profoundly to us today as we encounter our own wars, violence, and suffering, especially among the most vulnerable. And still, we struggle to know what to do. Let us take courage as we ponder the questions posed by Ita Ford in 1977: "Am I willing to suffer with the people here, the suffering of the powerless? Can I say to my neighbors, 'I have no solution to this situation. I don't know the answers, but I will walk with you, search with you, be with you?"

Missionizing begins at home

Many of the practices of the great "missionizing projects" of centuries past are seen as problematic in our age, with its greater sensibility of the rights of indigenous peoples to worship freely as they wish. So, while the legacy of one of the patrons of foreign missions, Saint Francis Zavier, is a mixed one, it is significant to note that he always provided for ongoing pastoral care of the communities he missionized and also advocated for an educated native clergy (rather than foreign-born leadership). None of us acts with perfect justice, but each of us finds ourself living in a unique historical moment, called upon to help church and society live up to the best and most noble qualities of our tradition.

After all those present have broken and shared the Opłatek, good food and Christmas car-ols (in Polish and English) are enjoyed.

This year, members of our Polish community will gather for a traditional Opłatek celebration, and they invite all parishioners to join them in this beautiful tradition.

8:15 am - Depart from Branch FH, 190 E. Main St., Smithtown


