By the time we almost get to the end of the month (the 28th), our observance of Easter will be concluded for this year. On the 28th, we mark the Solemnity of Pentecost and it will have been 50 days reveling in the joy of the Lord's Resurrection. We need all that time to take in and reflect on the victory of Christ over the perennial enemies of sin and death. How precious then is the gift of time for eternity is at stake after Jesus' defeat of sin and death!

Today is the Seventh Sunday of Easter – just a few days after the Solemnity of the Ascension. We are living with the tension of Jesus' apparent absence to the Church and the coming of the Holy Spirit, the Advocate as He is called in the Fourth Gospel. With the Spirit's assistance, the Church grows exponentially and today is found just about all over the world. As we say in the Nicene Creed every week, the Church is one, holy, catholic and apostolic.

I intend to summarize a few matters with this column and then return briefly to the reflections on *The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church*.

The first is an announcement that we will return to having what we know as the Offertory Procession at weekend Masses on June 10th and 11th when we celebrate the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. As you know, the Church has used an Offertory Procession at Mass wherein the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the altar for their consecration by the priest.

So, with the spread of COVID-19 less and less proximate now, we will restore the Offertory Procession in a few weeks. I ask the ushers at all four of our weekend Masses to bear this in mind so that the good order of the Liturgy may be maintained.

On Saturday the 13th, we had First Holy Communion Masses at Saint Margaret – two of them. The children who received their First Holy Communion numbered 63 this year. We congratulate them and their parents.

The next day, on Sunday the 14th, following the 12 noon Mass, we had our annual May Crowning at the grotto of our parish. As we did last year, we invited our First Holy Communion Class to be with us for the Mass and procession from our church to the grotto as we sang Marian hymns and crowned the statue of Our Lady. We had 7 First Holy Communicants with us.

We have needed the **Eucharistic Revival** for a long time, and how I wish the **Eucharistic Revival** began decades ago and how I wish it would continue for a few more decades. Whatever its length of time, which is three years according to the plan developed for us, we need to use that time as well as we can.

In the document *The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church*, the Bishops quote St. Teresa of Calcutta who said famously: "Once you understand the Eucharist, you can never leave the Church. Not because the Church won't let you but because your heart won't let you."

From the time we were first introduced to the Holy Eucharist at the age of discretion (7 years old) and made our First Holy Communion until we die, it is a matter of formation for the heart according to the saint of the slums. Formation always comes down to habits. We know this because of things totally unrelated to the Holy Eucharist. For instance, we wind up taking good care of personal health because we have regular patterns of eating and sleeping, work and leisure, exercise and mental stimulation. Those who take these endeavors seriously are, on balance, more likely to live longer and enjoy more satisfying lives than those who are careless in the areas cited above.

We are the habits which form us – not just physically but spiritually. As we eat and sleep at regular intervals, as we work diligently and recreate according to a schedule, and see that we work out our bodies and challenge ourselves intellectually, we become well and stay well – barring, of course, the things over which we have no control. When we pray regularly, when we go to church regularly (for Catholics every week), when we participate conscientiously in the Church's sacramental life, we are more likely to be in love with Christ and cherish His Church.



for the principal celebration of the parish's **75th Anniversary**. In the meantime, please continue to follow the bulletin on all things related to the anniversary of Saint Margaret.


Hands Needed!

Consume media with care

He couldn't have foreseen the technological advances the 21st century would bring. Yet in 1967, Pope Paul VI appreciated the need for a World Communications Day. He established the Sunday before Pentecost as an annual reflection on the opportunities and challenges of presenting the gospel message to a global society. The press, movies, radio, and television all commanded great attention in his generation. The internet and cell phones exponentially increase the range today. What are we saying and absorbing through all this media? Be a discerning steward of words and images.

Support vulnerable women

Rita of Cascia is the patron saint of abused wives because she herself was one. She endured years of verbal and physical abuse from her husband, and after he was murdered by a feuding family member, Rita became a nun. Read the U.S. Catholic Bishops' statement against domestic violence. On the USCCB website, you can also find downloadable "When I Call for Help" resource cards in English and Spanish that list signs of an abusive relationship and include the number of the National Domestic Violence Hotline. These are ideal for parish pamphlet racks, for placing in parish restrooms, and to raise awareness about domestic abuse. We owe it to Saint Rita to act.

Peace I leave with you

Twenty-five years ago today, citizens on both sides of the Northern Ireland conflict agreed—by referendum—to honor the Good Friday Agreement of 1998, ending nearly 30 years of bloodshed that took the lives of more than 3,500 Catholics and Protestants. For his dogged commitment to the work of peace and reconciliation, Catholic politician John Hume was named co-recipient of the 1998 Nobel Peace Prize. Hume, who also received both the Gandhi Peace Prize and the Martin Luther King Award—the only person ever to receive all three peace awards—said, "Bloodshed for political change prevents the only change that truly matters: in the human heart." Pray for peace today, and consider reading the U.S. bishops' pastoral letter *The Challenge of Peace*, which turned 40 this month.

Mary, Help of Christians, pray for us

Today marks the sad one-year anniversary of the mass shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas. Let us pray for the 21 people who died that day, including 19 children. Let us pray for their families. Let us pray for anyone who would ever entertain

even the slightest thought of causing such devastation. Today is also the feast of Mary, Help of Christians—a good day to pray for an end to gun violence. Consider this prayer to Mary, which begins: "Most Holy and Immaculate Virgin, Help of Christians, we place ourselves under your motherly protection. Throughout the Church's history you have helped Christians in times of trial, temptation, and danger. Time and time again, you have proven to be the Refuge of sinners, the Hope of the hopeless, the Consoler of the afflicted, and the Comforter of the dying."
