

We had a beautiful day for our celebration of the Solemnity of Corpus Christi and our parish observance of its 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary last Sunday. The weather was splendid, and with a Mass at a special time for a Sunday, followed by an outdoor Procession with the Blessed Sacrament, then Benediction back in church and, finally, with a Reception on the grounds of the church, we lifted our voices and rejoiced in the Presence of Christ in our midst until the end of time. How great it was.

I call your attention to the parish website where there are photos available from last Sunday, along with the church bulletin boards containing the same. With all things being the same, we will mark the Solemnity of Corpus Christi next year in precise-ly the way we did this year.

I thank all of those who participated in the above cited *acta*. Your witness to the Lord's gift of Himself in the Holy Eucharist is how the Body of Christ is built up in faith and good works. Let us be unflagging in our devotion to Christ's Real Presence that we might not miss out on the company of the Lord eternally.

Speaking of being in the company of the Lord eternally, we desire that for our fathers too. And, thus, I remind you to enroll your father, living or deceased, in our **Father's Day Novena of Masses.** Kindly return the envelope for that very purpose in the collection basket at Mass this weekend or place it in the designated box in the vestibule of the church. If you are not in possession of the said envelope, please request one from an usher.

On a completely different topic, I want to say a few words about an issue which has been in the news going all the way back to the month of May. It reached its nadir this past Friday. I am referring of course to the Los Angeles Dodgers baseball team choosing to honor the vile and disreputable group which goes by name of the "Sisters of the Perpetual Indulgence." This group of homosexual men mocks women Religious in the Catholic Church by publicly displaying a lewd lifestyle - all in the name of Pride.

When the issue first surfaced, the "Sisters of the Perpetual Indulgence" was invited and then disinvited because of their anti-Catholic bias. And then, all of a sudden, the group was re-invited by the pro baseball team to accept public plaudits for its anti-Catholicism. In the paragraph above, I said the nadir was reached at a Dodgers home game, also dubbed Pride Night, which was held on June 16<sup>th</sup>.

If there is a good part of this story, it would be that public figures such as pro baseball players spoke out against the terrible exercise of judgment by the Dodgers organization. They did so, knowing full well that they could be targeted for retaliation. But, in the end, that didn't matter because something else – more important than a flourishing athletic career – was at risk too. That something else of course is faith.

It is a reminder to all of us that the virtue of courage is needed if our witness to Catholicism is to mean anything at all. Silence is not what is called for – as much as this is what others expect from us. If you missed the opportunity to let the Los Angeles Dodgers and Major League Baseball know what you think about the approval conferred upon anti-Catholicism, I include here the email contact for the Senior Vice President of Marketing and Communications of the Dodgers (Erik Braverman). Just a few days ago (Friday the 16<sup>th</sup>), we marked the **Solemnity of the Sacred Heart**. Devotion to the Sacred Heart has been promoted by multiple Popes of the Catholic Church. As I suggested in my last edition of this column, you may want to pray the Litany of the Sacred Heart which may be found in any good Catholic prayer book. The Bishops of our nation have suggested we pray the Litany of the Sacred Heart as a way of making reparation for sin – our own and that of others. See the posters in church depicting the image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. And if you know younger Catholics, grandchildren perhaps, please consider introducing them to the Devotion to the Sacred Heart.



At county fairs there always seems to be a stand where someone offers to write your name on a grain of rice. As novel a proposition as that is, perhaps there are better places to have our names inscribed. Scripture mentions a "Book of Life" eight times. It's described as the registry of the just—a desirable place to be listed. Martyrdom is one sure way to make the registry and promoting the gospel is another. Simply put, bring Jesus to others. Witness with your values, decisions, and resources. Add your name to the book.

#### Monday, Jun 19, 2023

#### Take your place in paradise

A thousand years ago, Italian monk Saint Romuald founded a religious order, the Camaldolese, that blended the Christian hermit tradition into monastic life. His monks lived in individual cells but participated in some communal activities. Romuald's rule of life put solitude and contemplation and meditation on the Psalms at the center of his order's spirituality. He wrote, "Sit in your cell as in paradise. Put the whole world behind you and forget it. Watch your thoughts like a good fisherman watching for fish. The path you must follow is in the Psalms—never leave it." Tap into this tradition and try finding a place of solitude and, with the Psalms handy, carve out some quiet time for contemplation in your busy day.

#### Tuesday, Jun 20, 2023

#### We are one vast body in this one vast Lord

On this day in 1926, the 28th International Eucharistic Congress opened in Chicago, the first one held in the United States. Mass at Soldier Field attracted an estimated 400,000 people gathered in and around the stadium and featured a "Nuns and Women's Choir of 10,000 Voices." At its conclusion, 750,000 pilgrims joined a 40mile eucharistic procession—on foot or by car, bus, and rail—to St. Mary of the Lake Seminary in Mundelein, Illinois. A logistical marvel of mass transit, this gathering was as important for Chicago as it was for the U.S. church. Let these words, from 2021's international congress, be your meditation today: "He is our Lord and our Master, our friend and our food, our healer and our peace."

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 8:1-9; Matthew 5:43-48 (366). "They gave themselves first to the Lord and to us through the will of God."

#### Wednesday, Jun 21, 2023

#### Your mission

The brief life of Saint Aloysius Gonzaga (he died at 23) is instructive for all who hope to raise or nurture young faith. Though he was raised in royal privilege, a book about the experiences of Jesuit missionaries in India inspired Aloysius to leave his comfortable world behind and dedicate his life to God. As it turned out, his mission field would be closer to home, as he gave his life serving the sick during a terrible plague in Rome in 1591. Young people are inspired by heroic examples of service. Be that inspiration.

MEMORIAL OF ALOYSIUS GONZAGA, RELIGIOUS TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 9:6-11; Matthew 6:1-6, 16-18 (367). "Take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them .... your Father who sees in secret will repay you."

#### Thursday, Jun 22, 2023

#### Discipleship still can be costly

Sir (and Saint) Thomas More, the British humanist and statesman, stared down King Henry VIII and paid the price. He was beheaded in 1535 for refusing to support the king's desire to control the Catholic Church. The 1960 play (and later film) *A Man for All Seasons* kept alive More's considerable reputation as martyr and man of letters. More's final words affirmed that he was the "king's good servant and God's first." Most of us won't have to die for our faith, but many will pay a price for doing the right and faithful thing in a difficult situation. What has your faith cost you?

MEMORIAL OF THOMAS MORE, MARTYR TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 11:1-11; Matthew 6:7-15 (368). "Your Father knows what you need before you ask him."

#### Friday, Jun 23, 2023

#### 'Tis a gift

The classic rock song "Simple Man" was written by two musicians who had recently lost loved ones: a grandmother and a mother. As the two were sharing stories and advice from these women, the verses of a song began to emerge. The women's advice was simple: Remember God, slow down in life, follow your heart, and find everything you need in your soul. Living simply was key for these women, and it is key for our life as Christians. As you encounter the gospels in your prayer and during Mass, what values of simple living do you hear woven into its verses?

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 11:18, 21-30; Matthew 6:19-23 (369). *"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth."* 

#### Saturday, Jun 24, 2023

#### Find your voice

Zechariah, father of John the Baptist, stands in for all of us who fall silent when our doubt overcomes our faith. Along the path of life where we sometimes lose our way, it's difficult to trust that God is with us always. When Zechariah comes to his senses and realizes God is indeed active in his life through the wondrous birth of John, he is able to speak again. So it is with us. We find our authentic voice when we trust in God.

SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 49:1-6; Acts 13:22-26; Luke 1:57-66, 80 (587). "He asked for a tablet and wrote, 'John is his name,' and all were amazed. Immediately his mouth was opened, his tongue freed, and he spoke blessing God."
