

In just a few days, we mark Independence Day (July 4<sup>th</sup>). It is a national holiday and virtually everyone is off from work, with school having already closed for summer in the month of June. On this date in 1776, the thirteen colonies announced their intention to separate from the mother-land in Europe (Great Britain), calling their founding document drawn up mostly by Thomas Jefferson, the *Declaration of Independence*.

The Declaration of Independence is a marvelous document studied and analyzed not just in our nation but in nations all over the world. For the highest human aspiration is to live freely, not to be in subjugation to someone else. And once we are free, we will do just about anything to remain that way.

The Declaration is admired in many quarters because it takes seriously concepts like nature, truth, equality, and rights. There are laws of nature, the Declaration instructs us, and there is a God Who is over and above nature. Today, there are many people who dispute that there is such a thing as nature, and many more people who doubt that there is a God. As far as truth is concerned, the founders assert that some truths are self-evident. Well, there are many today who contest that there is even such a thing as truth. All we have, they say, are opinions which are favorable or unfavorable depending on social status. With regard to equality, the Declaration says it comes there from the beginning. Some, though, claim today it's only a fiction with inequity being dominant across all sectors of society. And with respect to rights, the Declaration stipulates that they are inalienable and given by our Creator. There are many today who oppose the understanding that rights are inherent in us, and argue instead that government is the source of rights.

We have an opportunity this year and every year on the Fourth of July to reflect on the real meaning of freedom, and to commit ourselves once again to a freedom informed by faith. That freedom informed by faith begins and ends with Christ, the freest Person Who ever walked the face of the earth. Sons and daughters of God that we are, we walk the path Jesus walked – all the way to the Cross. He Who is without sin stretched out His arms on that Cross to embrace us sinners. The victory won for us by Jesus over the Cross means that false conceptions of freedom cannot reign over us unless we *choose* a slavery to sin all over again. Saint Paul makes precisely this point in his Letter to the Galatians (5:1): "Do not submit again to the yoke of slavery," the apostle writes there.


Speaking of not submitting to the yoke of slavery again, we have much to gain in this respect if we consider the lives of the saints, especially those saints whom we honor this month in the liturgical calendar. Take, for example, Saint Ignatius of Loyola. A former soldier, Ignatius wrote his *Spiritual Exercises* as a way of teaching us to discern spirits. By the discernment of spirits, Saint Ignatius means we develop the interior capacities necessary for following Christ in all kinds of situations, especially those situations in which mature judgment is the very texture of discipleship.

Or what about Saint Benedict? He is considered the Father of Western Monasticism and founded some twelve monasteries, the most famous being the one at Monte Cassino in Italy. Similar to Saint Ignatius in some ways, Saint Benedict wrote his own *Rule*, focusing not on discernment but on the wise and trusted use of work and prayer to establish union with Christ.

Holiness is not univocal. It is attainable by any number of ways which come under the aegis of the Holy Spirit and the guidance of the Church. Holiness, in every case, follows upon a non-transferrable decision to make the priorities of Christ my own. Until I do that, I may only be dabbling in spiritual enthusiasms which have no long-term effects in my life. And wouldn't that be a deception of epic proportions. Indeed, it would. A self-deception. The best way to avoid self-deception in matters spiritual is to lean on others more advanced in the interior life than myself and learn from them how to grow to full stature in Christ.

#### Say what you see

Upon winning the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986, Elie Wiesel was named a "messenger to mankind." The Los Angeles Times called him the "most important Jew in America." A Holocaust survivor, Wiesel didn't speak of his experiences for 10 years after his liberation from the camps. Eventually he understood the world needed his witness: "We must take sides. Neutrality helps the oppressor, never the victim. Silence encourages the tormentor, never the tormented.... Wherever men and women are persecuted because of their race, religion, or political views, that place must at that moment—become the center of the universe." Tell the truth from where you stand.

#### A twin to us all

Three times in the Gospel of John, the apostle Thomas is also called Didymus. Both names mean "twin"—in Aramaic and Greek respectively. He is referred to in some non-biblical historical texts as "Judas Thomas"—a.k.a. "Judas the Twin." It's likely "the twin" was his nickname and he was known by it among Jews and Greeks. But there's no explanation of whose twin he was. Today, Christians mostly know him as "Doubting Thomas" because he didn't believe Jesus had risen until he saw for himself. While we don't know the identity of Thomas' biological twin, do we resemble him in our disbelief from time to time? Ask Jesus for the grace of faith and the same graciousness he showed to Thomas.

#### Born on the Fourth of July

Born on the Fourth of July is the best-selling memoir of Ron Kovic, Catholic Vietnam vet turned peace activist. On the fourth of July, in 1336, Saint Elizabeth of Portugal was born into eternal life. Like Kovic, Elizabeth threw herself into peacemaking-twice intervening to avert war. Like Kovic, the gueen bucked authority: When her husband forbade her from giving royal wealth away to the poor, Elizabeth smuggled contributions out of the castle in her robes. As Americans celebrate our good fortune this day, may the rights enshrined in the Declaration of Independence—"life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness"—be tempered by Elizabeth's example: "God made me queen so that I may serve others."

#### Wednesday, Jul 05, 2023

#### Be an island of justice

On this day in 1868, Rafael Cordero was born in San Juan, Puerto Rico, one of three children in a free black family. Throughout his life he was a passionate advocate for equitable education on the island, opening a free school for children in his home—the pupils of which would later include some of the most influential figures in Puerto Rican history. A devout Catholic, Cordero was also known

for his charity to the poor. He also fought for the abolition of slavery in Puerto Rico, which was achieved in 1873. Following his death, his schoolhouse became a historic site, and the archbishop of San Juan opened his cause for canonization. He was declared venerable by Pope Francis in 2013. May his legacy of justice live on in our own works of mercy.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 21:5, 8-20a; Matthew 8:28-34 (379). "God was with the boy as he grew up."

#### Thursday, Jul 06, 2023

#### Girl power

Today's saint, Maria Goretti, died a difficult death at age 12 after being stabbed for resisting a rape. She is one of several patron saints of rape survivors. Traditional hagiography about Goretti focuses on her concern for chastity during her resistance, but women who have survived similar ordeals might see saintliness in Goretti's resistance itself. They might reclaim Goretti's story as one of female empowerment, a refusal to be degraded, and a rising above violence when Goretti-on her deathbed-forgave her tormentor. Her act of mercy lives on as a triumph over evil. Saint Maria Goretti, pray for all who have been hurt by sexual violence.

MEMORIAL OF MARIA GORETTI, YOUTH MARTYR TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 22:1b-19; Matthew 9:1-8 (380). "He then said to the paralytic, 'Rise, pick up your stretcher, and go home."

#### Friday, Jul 07, 2023

#### Make a wish come true

When asked what he wished for his birthday on July 7, 2008, the Beatle's drummer Ringo Starr replied, "Peace and love." That simple wish grew into International Peace and Love Day celebrated around the world and even in outer space when a message of peace and love was sent from the International Space Station in 2020. Of course, wishing doesn't make it so. Start small. A little show of mercy and forgiveness will go a long way toward creating a world of peace and love.


