

Were not the 21st of January a Sunday this year, we would be honoring Saint Agnes, our diocesan patron. She was a virgin-martyr whose heroic witness to Christ was lived out in the late third century and early fourth century in Rome. Originally from the noble class of that city, Agnes became an intercessor for young girls upon her death. She wound up suffering a gruesome death, but not before resisting men who were seeking to rape her. Agnes' refusal to succumb to the advances made against her showed that chastity is a virtue not easily won in the Christian life. The good news is that it is won – through a combination of divine grace and human effort. Times are different, yes, but the virtue is never out of season.

The next day on the calendar, the 22^{nd} , is a date we have come to associate with an infamous Supreme Court decision – this being *Roe v. Wade*. When the ruling was made by the Justices (7-2), by the way in 1973, a constitutional right to abortion became the law of the land. Sanctioning abortion in this way precipitated enormous attitudinal shifts across the culture. The same was true when, in 2022, the Supreme Court (with different Justices on the bench) overturned *Roe*, we had not euphoria but a vitriolic fall-out that a "right" was taken away.

In the post-*Roe* culture, that is, after 1973 and before the Dobbs decision in 2022, the pro-life movement was born and grew. As with other social movements, there are always differing opinions about what was done. Was it enough? Could we have done more? I recall a conversation I had with a long-time pro-lifer who told me that he was disappointed that Church leaders were not as visible as they once were, nor were their voices heard as much as abortion became more accepted in the culture. In response, I said that the Church had done more than any other institution to assist the pro-life movement. In terms of teaching, in terms of the use of personnel (and their training), the expenditure of resources (financial especially), the formation of the laity (conferences, etc.) and so much more. The Church's record is therefore quite impressive.

At the same time, there is less "visibility" on the part of clerics (bishops and priests) in the pro-life movement. And it is true that there is less "speaking out" today than, say, twenty or thirty years ago. I don't think you can equivocate on these points.

But does that mean that we are "less" pro-life than we used to be? No, not necessarily so. It does however come down to individual commitment. Catholics now are considerably less inclined to put it "all on the line" than they were in the past. What I have in mind is something like the following: Getting on a bus at 6:00 AM or earlier, riding for hours, sometimes when it is very cold outside, standing in the cold listening to speakers, then marching down Pennsylvania Avenue in our nation's capital to the Supreme Court Building, stopping at a McDonald's or a Burger King on the way home for dinner, getting back at 10 PM or later – only to learn that your car in the church parking lot won't turn over. What a day! All this happening the day you travelled to and from the annual March for Life in Washington, D.C.

We once did such things, but we're a lot less inclined to do that now.

Just recently, a fellow Knight of Columbus told me about sponsoring an essay contest for local Catholic elementary school students in another part of our diocese. This Knight related how two parents took it upon themselves to submit their own essays but did not write about the beauty of human life. No, they wrote castigating those who dare to think that the pro-life position is the only position to have as a Catholic. Amazing but true as we are wont to say. It makes you think that indeed we haven't done enough. We could have done more.

But, somehow, we didn't. We did less and this is the result.

And that is why it is important to renew our commitment to the sanctity of human life, especially the sanctity of preborn life. Because if there isn't respect for human life in the womb, there won't be respect for human life at any other point. This happened to be the position of Mother Teresa, also known as Saint Teresa. The woman who dedicated herself to caring for the destitute and dying in Calcutta and other places in the world said the worst destroyer of peace is abortion.

It corresponds with the Old Testament word for repentance and the Latin *conversio*, turning or returning, from which derives the idea of *conversion*. *Turning* is key, assuming we have lost our way or gone off course.

The willingness to change is a crucial ingredient in a life of integrity. On the journey through the years, we will all be confused or misdirected and swerve off the path of truth. **Metanoia** is the much-needed spiritual course correction. Consider **metanoia** the vital summons to recalculate where we're headed and what needs to change for us to get there.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church; Jesus' call to conversion and repentance, does not aim first at outward works, but at the conversion of the heart, interior conversion, [H] owever, interior conversion urges expression in visible signs, gestures, and works of penance (1430).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What does it mean to repent?

Repentance doesn't necessarily require falling on our knees and beating our breasts, though

sometimes that may be the appropriate response—as it was for skeptical Thomas, when the resurrected Lord whom he'd doubted stood before him. Basically, to repent means to change course. That can mean movement if we've been standing still, or stopping if we've been in frantic motion. It can mean changing our minds or our hearts, our direction or our behavior.

The word has several important root meanings. The earliest is the Hebrew word *I'shuvah*: return. It's a crucial concept to prophets like Amos, Hosea, and Jeremiah. Their fellow citizens have wandered far from God's ways, and it's time for them to return home. *Metanoia* is the New Testament Greek term that carries a similar meaning. John the Baptist first issues the call to change direction, signaled by Baptism, Jesus uses this term when he invites his listeners to change their dispositions—to turn their hearts and lives around—in response to his teaching. Repentance carries the additional meaning of expressing regret for past actions and attitudes—along with the expectation that real change is forthcoming. In addition, the word *conversion* means turning around, implying a reorientation of intentions and actions. In the sacrament of Reconciliation, we include the stipulation of "making reparation" for what we've done or failed to do that has caused harm


