

On the last Sunday of this first month of a new year, I want to mention a few matters briefly and then spend more space and time on one matter.

This weekend, we introduce **Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament** on Saturday afternoons starting at 4:00 PM. I encourage parishioners to join us while the Eucharistic Lord is present on the altar, in the monstrance, to pray in His Presence.

Just a few weeks ago, we celebrated Christmas, and now that the Christmas season is completed, we have begun listening to texts at Mass (daily and Sunday) concerning the public ministry of Jesus. I recall here that the early earthly life of Jesus included several incidents recorded in Saint Luke's Gospel – among them the **Presentation.** In accord with the dictates of the law, the Blessed Mother and Saint Joseph brought the Christ Child to the Temple for the purpose of dedicating the Infant to the Lord. We mark this moment liturgically on February 2nd, this year a Friday. The Feast of the Lord's Presentation is also known as **Candlemas Day**.

The next day, February 3rd, the church remembers Saint Blaise, Bishop and Martyr. We associate Saint Blaise with a **Blessing of the Throats.** Since it is a Saturday this year, we will offer a Blessing of the Throats **after** the 5:00 PM Mass to any parishioners who would like to receive it.

A little more than two weeks from now, we begin our yearly Lenten observance on **Ash Wednesday**. Please see the bulletin boards in church for the Ash Wednesday **schedule** when ashes will be imposed. It begins in the morning when Mass is offered at 9:00 AM and closes with a Mass celebrated in the evening at 7:30 PM. In between, ashes are distributed at services – the first at 12 noon and the second at 4:00 PM.

And now to the topic which I will treat at greater length.

From time to time, I have used this space in the weekly bulletin to weigh in on matters financial. And here I am referring to our parish finances. I have remarked periodically on the collections fluctuating pretty significantly for a parish of this size. We seem to do pretty well on the first weekend of the month with a combination of offerings given in person at weekend Masses and electronic giving. Although I point out this pattern first, I want to make clear that we have only a pattern – for the first weekend of this month, the collection totaled less than \$9,000.00. You may recall that on occasion I have asked for our collections to be \$12,000.000 and higher every weekend. This has not occurred.

We have to do much better with weekend collections. And, thus, I renew my appeal to all parishioners that they give generously and sacrificially to Saint Margaret. To use one image, we need all oars in the water at the same time, all rowing in the same direction. This has to start now; otherwise, we will fall behind in our payment of bills and we will quickly start accruing debt. This is never good for any parish - to take on debt, no matter what its size, too. Debt holds parishes back from carrying out their mission and Saint Margaret is no exception.

Currently, our parish includes many, many parishioners who do not contribute anything to weekend collections. And we have many other parishioners who contribute so little to Saint Margaret as to be negligible in the overall financial picture. We all need to exercise all three parts of stewardship: time, talent and **treasure**. We neglect the last **t** to our own peril.

As a pastor, I take seriously my responsibility of caring for the temporal goods of the parish. We do this here by having a budget which is lean to the bone. There is no fat in it. And I will not put at risk parish assets which may very well be needed in the future for considerations beyond our planning and beyond our control.

I have requested permission to sell parish property, and I was given the "green light" to pursue this matter unto a favorable outcome. I have been interviewed by the Diocesan Real Estate Board once, I have discussed this matter with our parish's business officer, I have discussed the endeavor with our parish finance committee and with the two parish trustees. Their approval (finance committee and trustees), most importantly, has also been given.

I will continue to follow the directives for pastors wishing to sell parish property. By the way, I have done this before in a previous assignment as Pastor. In that parish, when all the dust settled, a windfall profit well into the millions of dollars was realized. The future of that parish is now financially secure.

Undertaking a sale of parish property is a lengthy, involved process. I promise to keep you informed about all the developments along the way.

WORD OF THE WEEK

Benedictus \be-nə-'dik-təs\

From Latin meaning "blessed," the hymn sung by Zechariah, John the Baptist's father, an elder priest, who became mute on learning that he and Elizabeth would become parents late in life. After John's birth, Zechariah's tongue is loosed and he praises God with this canticle beginning: "Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, for he has come to his people and set them free" (Luke 1:68).

CONTEXT

Since the early centuries, the **Benedictus** has been sung in the morning prayer of the church's liturgy because of its praise for the coming of the Redeemer and its allusion to Christ coming as the dawn to give light to those in darkness.

May I have the courage today/ To live the life that I would love,/ To postpone my dream no longer,/ But do at last what I came here for/ And waste my heart on fear no more.

WHY IT MATTERS

The **Benedictus** is one of four canticles sung at the start of Luke's gospel, including Mary's Magnificat, (My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord), the song of the angels to the shepherds (Glory to God in the highest!), and Simeon's prayer at the presentation of Jesus in the temple (Lord, now you let your servant go in peace). Together these songs remind us that, in the face of good news, the most reasonable response is to sing. Joyful people know this.

From The General Instruction on the Liturgy of the Hours: The Gospel canticles, the *Benedictus*, the *Magnificat* and the *Nunc dimittis*, should be accorded the same solemnity and dignity as is usual for the hearing of the Gospel (138).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Why do we sing at Mass?

Saint Augustine, who said many things well, insisted: "Singing is for one who loves." This is the same Bishop Augustine who considered banning music from his church altogether. In the end he adhered to an older proverb: "Whoever sings well prays twice over." So pass out the song sheets.

Saint Paul was an earlier proponent of church music, back when church still gathered in somebody's house. He advocated that believers sing "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God" (Col. 3:16). While Augustine got it right that singing is for lovers, happy people in general whistle while they work, and grateful people know they have something to sing about. This may explain why some folks in church are reluctant to sing. Without a significant increase in the spirit of joy and gratitude, don't expect an increase in responsive singers. Yet to those who love, feel joy, and are grateful, a little frivolity in public is in order.
