



We are already at the Third Sunday of Lent, about half way through this penitential season. From this point forward, the gospel at Mass will come from the Gospel according to Saint John. And the first Johannine text, today's, concerns the temple. It is the center of Jewish life in the city of the prophets (Jerusalem). Jesus is in the temple and He is not pleased. He is not pleased because the money-changers have made a mockery of the temple and so He drives them out. Those who watched what Jesus did were astonished and they demanded a sign from Him. This time, Jesus announces that the temple destroyed will be raised up. The evangelist tells us next that Jesus was referring to the temple of His body.

Although we are not yet at Easter, the gospel at today's Mass is prepping us for a celebration of the Resurrection. The prepping is getting us ready not just for a resurrection of the spirit but a bodily one. Although the New Testament is very clear about a bodily Resurrection, an overly spiritualized understanding of Christ's Resurrection has taken root in not a few places. To separate the body from the spirit is basically Gnostic. Gnosticism has been around for a long time and there are, alas, modern versions of this heresy. In every instance of the heresy, priority is given to the intangible over the tangible and fails to affirm the body-soul unity of personhood, which is at the core of our Christian an-thropology and serves too as a fundamental dimension for the outlook of Western Civilization.

Speaking of tangible, concrete things, **and** things of the spirit or soul, we have a number of them to comment on for this first Sunday of March.

We continue with the **Holy Hours on Monday nights** – our third one this Lenten season tomorrow night. Continue to join us from 7:30 until 8:30 PM in the church. The Holy Hour consists of time for personal prayer in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, the proclamation of Sacred Scripture and preaching on themes related to our witness and discipleship.

We also continue to pray the **Stations of the Cross** on Fridays at 12 noon. Again, please join with us as we recall the suffering Jesus endured on His way to victory over the Cross.

Every Saturday, we have a 45 minute period of **Eucharistic Adoration** from 4:00 PM until 4::45 PM. This time frame is ideal for those coming to attend the 5:00 PM Mass and for those who are going to confession. Please take some time to pray before the Eucharistic Lord in the monstrance on the altar.

Further along in in the year, we are having a **Communion Breakfast** on May 26th, the last Sunday of that month. We invite all to join us at the 10:00 AM Mass (the Communion part) and the Breakfast in the auditorium immediately following the Mass. More details will be forthcoming right after Easter.

The very next week (on June 2^{nd}) we will mark the **Solemnity of Corpus Christi.** The principal Mass that weekend is at 10:00 AM. Following the Mass at 10:00 AM, there will be an outdoor Procession with the Blessed Sacrament as we had last year. There will be a light reception in the church basement following the Procession. Again, more details will follow post-Easter.


At the end of this month, starting on the 24th, **Holy Week** commences. I mention now the importance of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. As I have said many times before, attendance at the liturgies of the **Sacred Triduum** has fallen way off from the 1970s and 1980s. I encourage all to make an effort to pray with us on these days at the prescribed hours.

Regarding Holy Thursday, I mention that there will be Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament following the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper. We are looking for parishioners to keep vigil before the Holy Eucharist up until midnight. That is approximately three hours in length. We will have a sign-up for that in the vestibule of the church in the next few days. The rehearsal dates and times for the liturgies of the **Triduum** have been established. They were indicated in last week's bulletin. There are reminders on the church bulletin boards too. These are important moments for us to prepare well for the grace the Lord bestows on us through the rites themselves. All who are assigned to these liturgies are **required** to attend the rehearsals. We want to pray reverently the Church's prayer, and that can only occur if we know what we are to do and when we are to do it.

A future edition of the bulletin will have the complete schedule for Holy Week. For now, I just want to say that early in Holy Week there is something called **Reconciliation Monday** (March 25th). This is a rather long-time practice of the Church here in the Diocese of Rockville Centre wherein priests are available to hear the confessions of penitents for six hours, beginning in the middle of the afternoon and going through 9:00 PM. More commentary will be offered on that next week.


