

At some point or other, we have all probably heard the expression "Oh, saints alive." It's an exclamation of wonder. It's a recognition that someone from the past, a holy person, is with us again. It's also an acknowledgement that we used to have people like this all around us, but not anymore. It's a rarity now.

Saints, those canonized as such, belong to the past. As any survey of the history of the saints will show: more saints lived then (in the past) and not now. With an horizon in front of us, we are inclined to be future oriented and only occasionally do we dare to look back in time. Let's do a little of that looking back right now. And let us go right to Saint Benedict who began his life in the late 5th century (480) and lived nearly as far as the mid-point of the next century (547).

The first thing to remember about Saint Benedict was that he loved the monastery. Any monastery, too. For his formation as a Christian, as a genuine man of faith, was inseparably related to monasticism. His life was ordered to prayer and work (*ora et labora*, as we say in Latin). In the monastery, the chapel is for praise of God and, outside, the garden or field is for work.

In addition to prayer and work, the monk's life revolves around what is known as a *Rule*, in this case, the *Rule of Saint Benedict*. It was a major accomplishment for Saint Benedict, giving his brothers a plan by which they could find true sanctity in community. And not only for the Benedictines. Saint Benedict's *Rule* was also a blueprint for other Religious communities or families (to which they are sometimes called) in the Church.

Saint Benedict's most famous monastery is the one at Monte Casino in central Italy. It still gets visitors to this day; I visited there while I was studying in Rome more than fifteen years ago. The buildings there still bear the strafing marks of German planes during World War II. There is also a cemetery located there, where Allied soldiers are interred.

What is the significance of Saint Benedict's life today? In a couple of words, it would be that monasteries are where holiness flourishes, and where the culture of the West is preserved too. By the culture of the West, I mean the great works of art, literature, and music are studied and held in high esteem because they represent the best of what has been thought and said the world over.

These days, holiness of life and preserving the Western canon are not exactly popular in "chic" circles. They are considered, unfortunately, passe. On the other hand, a small minority of Christians, mostly Catholics, see in Saint Benedict's life a way of emerging from the spiritual atrophy which afflicts us now, along with rising above the dark hue of nihilism which grips the culture now.

A number of years ago, Rod Dreher published the volume *The Benedict Option*. He intended his book to be a clarion call for Christan men and women to leave behind their "regular lives" and lake up a kind of monasticism, that is, living apart from the "world" in contrast with their peers who have succumbed to a desultory "worldliness." At the same time, other serious-minded Christians only see in the Benedict Option an unwise separation from the place where the seeds of faith are sown in what many call a New Evangelization. That last term, New Evangelization, coined by Pope Saint John Paul II, has never really taken hold in practice though — mostly because of the "privatization" of religion and the West's very deep secularization. Whatever reading you favor, either withdrawal or engagement, it is clear that a radical commitment to the faith is needed now more than ever. That's why it's time, I say, for 'saints alive."

I am going to close by offering a brief commentary on the sudden death of one who made a big mark in a short period of time. I am referring to Karen Norris, our administrative assistant in the pastoral center, who died on July 2nd in the early morning at Mather Hospital in Port Jefferson. She was employed for only a year at Saint Margaret. During that time, she was generous with her time (was she ever!), and did so many things quietly behind the scenes that only made us marvel at her ingenuity.

We pray for her and commend her gentle soul to the mercy of God. Requiescat in pace.


